PROFESSIONAL PLACEMENT (COD608) and ALTERNATIVES

COD608 is a 6-point placement unit which runs over 2 semesters (Y enrolment option), so it's like doing 3 credit points in each of the two semesters. If you're studying full-time you should enrol in this unit in your **third** semester at Murdoch. If you are studying part-time it's best to enrol in the internship unit towards the end of your course. The unit involves undertaking a placement of 160 hours with a chosen organisation, usually over the course of 2 semesters. Students are responsible for sourcing their own placement but are given guidance and ideas about how to go about this at the beginning of the first semester. There is an option to enrol in COD608 in one single semester if needed but for most students we recommend doing this unit over two semesters

Students who don't wish to undertake the internship unit can enrol in 2 alternative 3-point units:

- **AST650:** Culture, Communities and Sustainability in Asia (semester one)
- **EDN546:** Dynamics of Cultural Diversity in the Workplace and the Community (semester 2)

ELECTIVES AND RESEARCH UNITS

During your studies you need to choose whether you undertake a short research project (**SWM620: 3 points**) or the longer dissertation program (**ART610: 12 points**). You also need to choose a number of specified electives during your course. The number of electives you study will depend on which of these research programs you undertake. This doesn't need to be decided at the beginning of your course, but you will have to decide about this for your second year (or later on if you are part-time).

- If you undertake the **3-point Research Project (SWM620)** unit in your final year, you will need to study 7 units (21 credit points) as specified electives during your whole degree
- If you undertake the larger **12-point Research Dissertation (ART610)**, you will be able to study four units (12 credit points) as specified electives during your degree
- Enrolling in the Research Dissertation (ART610) requires an average of a Distinction in your first-year units
- ART610 can be studied in one semester, or spread over 2 semesters

SPECIFIED ELECTIVES

You can choose from the range of specified electives detailed below. Some electives also run in the summer or winter terms. If you are from a non-English speaking background, we strongly recommend that in your first semester you enrol in **TLC501** Communication Skills for post-graduate study.
